

AN UPDATE ON HOUSING

Increasing Pendleton's available housing is one of the City Council's top four priorities. We especially lack affordable housing for lower-income families, and this need was made even worse by the flooding that hit the Riverside area hard in early February. A May 2019 Housing Needs Analysis shows that Pendleton needs to add 870 new dwelling units in the next 20 years, with many of these units being required for families who make less than the Median Family Income. With this goal in mind, the City seeks to gain at least 50 new housing units each year, a goal that we met in 2017 and 2018 but failed to meet in 2019. In 2020 we have already issued 43 new housing permits and appear to be on track to exceed our goal of 50 by a healthy margin.



Even before we encountered construction delays caused by COVID-19, Pendleton had some characteristics that make development and building cost more expensive than in some other cities. We drew a tight Urban Growth Boundary some 40 years ago and this limits the amount of available land to develop. Much of the remaining land is rocky with steep slopes, which increases construction costs. Without subsidies and tax breaks, these factors make the construction of affordable housing almost impossible.

The good news is that Pendleton is on track to gain 80 new affordable housing units. In March, the Emergency Board (E -Board) of the state legislature appropriated \$7.5 million in flood recovery money for Umatilla County. This was later trimmed to about \$6.8 million and some \$900,000 of that was earmarked for the CTUIR. The County gave Pendleton the lead on using the rest of the money to build affordable housing. In July, the City used \$500,000 to buy out Saj Javangi's interest in the Pendleton Heights housing project by Olney Cemetery. We are in the process of selling this property for \$533,000 to Chrisman Homes, a respected builder of affordable housing from Enterprise, Oregon. This will allow us to pay off all of our LID debt on the property. We worked with Oregon Housing and Community Services, the Legislative Fiscal Office, CAPECO, and Oregon Regional Solutions to get the authority to let Chrisman Homes use the remaining funds to build 80 units of affordable housing on the old Pendleton Heights property. Victims of the February flooding will be given priority for the occupation of these new housing units when they are completed. Given the slow nature of construction during the COVID-19 environment, we expect the construction to take about two years.

In addition to these affordable housing units, there are a lot of market-rate apartments being built. More than 30 apartments are under construction near the RAC and the Pratt company is still on track to turn the old Forest Service building into about 31 apartments. The 200 + apartment project between EOCI and BMCC is still on track, but moving more slowly than we initially planned. Construction designs for this project are being reviewed by the City Bu ilding Department. The City is also working with landowners inside the UGB to see how we might get some future housing developments going. A lack of infrastructure is the biggest obstacle to overcome.

Progress is always slower than we would like, but I confidently predict that Pendleton will gain more than 300 new housing units in the next three years.

AIRPORT NEWS

In March 2015, the Pendleton City Council accepted a 1.155 million dollar IFA loan from the Governor and Business Oregon. The loan was for the construction of a 9,600 s.f. UAS (drone) hangar, which eventually became home to the much-acclaimed Vahana Project (flying unmanned taxi-In addition to being very low interest, the loan also contained a very cab). generous \$500,000 forgivable component, if the UAS range could meet certain milestones, the most difficult being the creation of 100 jobs within 5 years of completion. When that 100 job requirement was read aloud at Council, City Manager Robb Corbett remembers audible chuckles coming from the audience, some of whom thought the target was unattainable and that the UAS range was a royal waste of time and money. In March of 2017, after several delays, the hangar was completed by Pendleton-based McCormack Construction, and then our job creation clock started ticking. At the end of 5 years, had we created no jobs, then there would have been no forgiveness, just an extra \$500,000 in loan to pay.

On Thursday, August 6th, with more than 1.5 years to spare, the City received a closeout letter from Business Oregon acknowledging the achievement of the 100 job milestone, the equivalent of 208,000 man-hours. That accomplishment makes \$500,000 of the \$1.155m IFA loan forgivable, or essentially a grant. Of note, the airport's CARES Act grant paid off the remaining balance on the hangar loan, so the City now owns the 3.5-year-old hangar free and Also of note, the hangar has generated over \$350,000 in revenue clear. since its completion. The State will still require the UAS range to remain open and actively marketing until December 31, 2021, but that will not be a problem, because the range has never been busier. 7 companies now consider Pendleton their flight test home and more jobs are being created every month. At present, the UAS range is working with Volatus Group and BMCC to launch an unparalleled UAS training program, in hopes of developing more local workforce to fill these new jobs. It's also important to remember that these new companies and these new workers are having many positive impacts on the local and regional economy: lodging; dining; shopping; office supplies; home sales; apartment rentals; car rentals; hardware; cleaning; painters; and construction; just to name a few. Those are almost all local businesses enjoying new customers that did not even exist here a couple of years ago. It's accurate to assume that most of these companies are from out -of-state, and because they require very specialized skillsets, they often bring in their workforce. However, locals are working for these companies, and the purpose of our UAS training program is to steadily increase that number. 
