DEALING WITH TWO FLOODS

I want to start this column by commending the tremendous work done by the members of Pendleton's public works, public safety, Parks and Rec, facilities, the Convention Center, and many other departments in their fast and efficient response to the Umatilla River flooding that began on Thursday, February 6th.

The County, ODOT, State Police, the Sheriff's office and National Guard all worked together in a seamless fashion throughout Umatilla County. Hundreds of volunteers poured in to help the relief effort. They have donated meals, clothing, heavy equipment, trucks, trailers, and of course, hundreds of unpaid hours. By now, you may be aware that the river crested at about 20,000 cubic feet of water per second (CFS), which dwarfs the approximately 13,000 CFS of the 1965 high water event. While damage to City infrastructure is extensive, especially the levies on the west side of town, the hardest hit were Westside manufacturing plants and private property owners. We estimate that about 400 workers will be laid off until the manufacturing plants can reopen. Flood damage to homes was mostly in the Riverside area. As usual, Pendleton's citizens responded as soon as the call for help went out. The Red Cross put out a request on Saturday morning and by 3 pm they had more than 75 volunteers signed up. Food and clothing poured into the Convention Center where the Red Cross and the City were helping flood victims. Hundreds of more volunteers showed up at Riverside to help.

City officials went to Salem and met with Governor Brown on Monday, 10 February to request financial assistance from the State. By late Wednesday, almost 250 tons of debris had been removed from the Riverside area. On Thursday, 13 February, a Multi-Agency Resource Center began helping citizens at the Convention Center. Governor Brown toured the County and Pendleton on 14 February, followed by a visit from Senator Ron Wyden on the 15th and 16th. Senator Jeff Merkley will visit Pendleton on 21 February and will host a town hall meeting at the Convention Center.

Based on our experience from last April's flooding, we can expect the recovery from this flood to take many months, perhaps even years.

Speaking of last April's flooding at McKay Creek, the City finally received its temporary permit to clean out the McKay Creek bed and restore water flow to 1500 CFS. Work began immediately and will go for the next six weeks at 10 hours a day/ six days a week.

We estimate that about 800 truckloads of gravel need to be removed. All work must stop by 31 March.

I want to express my most sincere gratitude to all of you who helped respond to this crisis.

PAYING FOR THE IMPACTS OF THE RECENT FLOODING

Questions have arisen recently about how the City will pay for damages from the recent flooding. We have asked the State of Oregon, via both the Governor and our elected representatives, for at least \$2.8 million. About \$1 million of this is to help pay for the costs of displaced persons. The other \$1.8 million will be used for levy repairs, mostly on the west end of town. We hope to eventually be reimbursed by FEMA for 75% of these costs. The State has shown a strong desire to help and this request is being considered in Salem.

A question has come up if we are taking money from our street maintenance funds to pay for flood damage. The answer is no. The City still intends to raise an additional \$1.0 million in 2020-2021 so we can budget \$2.2 million for street repairs. The Pendleton Development Commission has voted to use \$1.4 million in urban renewal resources to repair streets that are in the urban renewal district. These funds are in addition to the \$2.2 million coming from the City budget.



The City of Pendleton would like to thank the many people in and around our community who came together providing the amazing assistance to help those in our area who were impacted by the floods.

Pendleton Convention Center Commission Winter Update 2020 Greetings from your City Council PCC liaison Jake Cambier.

Welcome to our newest commission member Tyson Furstenberg.

Our convention center main floor is brand new as of mid December and looks great, thanks to T&T Contractors of Hillsboro, Oregon.

We renewed our OSAA 2A tournament host contract for another 3 years and PCC Manager, Pat Beard, is working on an overlay basketball floor with Action Flooring of Portland to replace the used twenty plus year old floor purchased from the Phoenix Suns.

The meeting rooms and hallways on either side are repainted and we will be seeking room name sponsors in the near future.

Room #4 on the west side will be named for the late Scott Fairley, who served as a City Councilor and was lost this year.

The Happy Canyon Room renovation project to include new flooring, ceiling, lighting, sound system, bar area and décor is estimated to cost \$150,000 and has already been promised a match-required \$50,000 grand from Mike and Jill Thorne as well as a \$10,000 grant from Umatilla County. All of these funds are being handled through the Greater Eastern Oregon Development Center.

More recently your convention center was used as a safe haven for those displaced from their homes by the Umatilla flood. Then, in addition to hosting Buckaroo Booster's Banquet and Auction, on the next day it hosted a successful multiagency consortium to provide services to flood victims.

CHIEF JIM CRITCHLEY

Serving the community has always been a part of Jim's life. Yep, he is an Eagle Scout! And he was an altar boy. He also was a diver – both off the board in high school and in murky lakes for rescue in college. His initial college career was heavily weighted with intermural sports – but his later career was fire sciences and public administration.

He spent equal time on the soccer field and reading fire tactics and leadership books to his babies. When he had daddy duty with preschool prep for our 3-year-old daughter, he bought a self-help book to learn to make a "fishtail" with her waist-length mob of hair. He was always the den leader, the pack leader or the coach – cramming all of those meetings in between paramedic and chief fire officer training. Our kids thought the park and the station houses were truly their other homes!

Our kids knew that they could always ask us when parent volunteers were needed. As a result, we have seven kids in Omagh Northern Ireland and one in Germany that called Jim dad for at least a month and up to a year! Jim has always opened our home to wayward children and stray dogs, both of which have enriched our lives. Nine years ago he agreed, without introduction, to be Godfather to one of my NICU babies. A family, the father active military, had moved to our town and was without any family support. They had a fourteen-year-old and a new baby girl with a very rare chromosomal disorder. I adopted them in the hospital and was asked to be the Godmother. Without support in the continental US, they asked if my husband would be her God Father – of course, he said yes. Our beautiful Goddaughter Gia has just this last year adapted to walking, we are so blessed to have her added to our menagerie! Jim was easy with Gia as he was with our own babies; despite the feeding tubes, medications and communication barriers. Watching him with our kids, our adopted kids and our God Kids makes me know I made a truly lucky decision 33 years ago!

Jim and I married in 1988 – during the sixth week of the fire academy!

Needless to say, the wedding was set before we found out he was in, too late to change much. His training chiefs sent him home early that day – not because of the wedding but because of pneumonia! His recruit class crashed our reception, drank all of the beverages and ate all of the food. However, I can say even today, some of those firefighters are truly still part of our family thirty-some years later. I had no inkling he was going to one day be the chief of that department, though his classmates said it was a given even then. Jim was in medic class when Kristi came – she would nod off to the rhythmic reading of treatment algorithms. She also taught herself to read, as we both were constantly studying during her first three years. Donovan arrived during captain's cert and Liam just as Jim was on the list for

training captain. We managed to squeeze family celebrations in between shifts; I think even today the kids think "birthday" is a random term for the month you were born in and are happy to celebrate daily, weekly and as many times as necessary! The true holiday happens when pops gets off shift, not when it is printed on the calendar! All and all, the kids have a wonderful skill of adaptation – it is a holiday whenever we are all together!

Fire Life is a wonderful life.

It has afforded our family amazing blessings and awesome sights. Jim's travels with the various fire chief's organizations allowed our kids to "trick or treat" in Emmetsburg Maryland and take a "ghost tour" in Gettysburg on Halloween at midnight. They have been to the Pacific Northwest and Hawaii, all in the name of the Fire Service.

They have grown into amazing caring and loving adults that will literally give you their lunch, their shoes and their wallet.

All of these blessings are the fruit picked from an abundant family tree built by a man they adore and would follow anywhere. Pendleton Oregon, thanks for welcoming us to your town and your lives! Jim will be an asset to your community and we will endeavor to serve with him as his devoted family.

THE SCOTT FAIRLEY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Scott Fairley Memorial Scholarship Fund provides tuition for undergraduate students from Eastern Oregon University to participate in the Urban and Rural Ambassadors Summer Institute, a partnership of Portland State University and Eastern Oregon University.

Creating leaders who bridge the divide

The institute is a unique, ten-day, six-credit residential summer course where students explore urban and rural connections in Oregon and develop the collaborative skills to work across Oregon's urban-rural divide. The institute enables tomorrow's leaders to learn from each other about regional commonalities and differences. Students develop the capacity to forge a path through the tension and stalemate that often characterize urban-rural debate and to find solutions that fit local economies, values, and ways of life for the advancement of Oregon as a whole.

Scott Fairley—a legacy of collaborating

Scott Fairley was a long-time resident of Pendleton, Oregon. He graduated from Pendleton High School before attending the University of Oregon. For more than twenty years, he was a dedicated public servant, and as a Pendleton City Councilor, he was a strong advocate for establishing goals to drive and measure progress and improvement. He had a reputation for being energetic, committed, forward-thinking, and unafraid to take on hard issues. He died unexpectedly on January 7, 2020, at the age of 53.

At the time of his death, Fairley was serving the fourth year of his first term on the Pendleton City Council and was regional development officer for Business Oregon. Before that he did public affairs work for the Oregon Department of Transportation, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality and later for the Governor's Office as eastern region coordinator. Fairley had also served on several public and community committees over the years including the Planning Commission, Airport Commission, Budget Committee, Farmers Market, and Youth Soccer Association.

Those who worked closely with Fairley knew well his advocacy for eastern Oregon, whether it was through his work as a state employee or his time on the city council. He was known as a collaborator with an uncommon ability to bring people together on divisive issues.

As a city councilor, Fairley built bonds with all of Pendleton's residents and across government, nonprofit, and public sectors. He was a devoted family man and lover of the outdoors, remembered by his community as having also devoted his life to making Pendleton a better place to live.

The memorial fund is a fitting tribute to a public servant who understood rural and urban issues and served the public across the state. Nathan Lowe, Dean of the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences at Eastern Oregon University writes:

"I think a memorial for Scott that provides scholarships for the Urban Rural Ambassadors Summer Institute is a good match in light of what Scott did in his life. We will honor Scott's legacy in eastern Oregon by continuing to develop a meaningful and impactful program. The response we hear from students who take the course is that it far exceeds their expectations, and that it has led them to better appreciate the nuances and complexities of diverse communities in the state. This scholarship fund will support more students in building bridges of understanding across the state."


