

Explaining the "Right to Rest"

Like most other cities in America, Pendleton is wrestling with how to manage its homeless population. The City does not intend to use its limited resources to provide robust services to the homeless. Nevertheless, they are fellow human beings and they have the same Constitutional rights that the rest of us enjoy. A couple of fairly recent Federal District Court cases have further defined the rights of the homeless and have issued guidance on what cities can and cannot do.



In 2019's <u>Martin v. Boise</u>, the Court held that there is a right to be homeless and to be able to rest. The government could not criminalize homeless people for sleeping outdoors on public property if there was no other access to shelter. More recently, in the July of 2020 case of <u>Blake v. City of Grants Pass</u>, the Court said that the homeless could not be denied the life-sustaining activities of resting, sleeping, and seeking shelter from the elements. The City of Grants Pass had an anti-camping ordinance that also prohibited sleeping in a car for more than two hours. These laws applied to all public spaces in Grants Pass at all times, including parks. There were no public shelters available in Grants Pass.

The recent "Right to Rest" ordinance passed by the City Council tries to walk the line between providing legal access to some public properties to sleep (not camping) while denying rest in other public properties. For example, our parks have closed at 10:00 pm for many years. Therefore, we will not grant permission to routinely camp overnight in our parks (the City Manager has the authority to grant a waiver for special events). People may not sleep in the right of way (including sidewalks, driveways, and doorway entrances). They are permitted, however, to sleep (including inside a tent) on other public property from 10:00 pm to 6:00 am the next day, but they may not establish a temporary campsite. They must pack up their belongings, clean-up, and vacate their sleeping spot by 6:00 am.

Where are these other public properties? Well, the City owns parcels of land near the Convention Center, surrounding all public buildings, six vacant acres in the north Riverside area and near the airport. The Umatilla River banks are public property and there are a few small publicly owned parcels of land scattered about the City. The Community Development Department can provide more specific information on where the City owns the property.

Is this new ordinance perfect? Of course not, but it does a couple of things. It complies with Federal law by affirming the right of the homeless to rest and guides when and where that might take place. It provides a tool that the police can use to enforce the law and it provides a reasonable right of appeal before legal action would take effect. Remember that none of this pertains to your private property and if you have a problem with homeless campers, please call the Pendleton Police Department so you can have them "trespassed."

CITY STAFF ACTIVITY

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Pendleton Fire and Ambulance had a slower than the normal second quarter due in part to COVID-19 fears and the stay at home order in March and April. We had our busiest of June, July, and August. We are transporting COVID-19 patients from their homes and hospitals all around the region. Year to date we have had 1557 EMS calls, 11 structure fires, and 20 wildland fires. Our crews responded on mutual aid to Umatilla and Pilot Rock during the labor day fires. We sent a Task Force Leader and a Type 6 brush truck and crew to Clackamas county for a little over a week to assist the Oregon State Fire Marshal with the devastating fires in that region.

PFD&A is working on health and fitness programs for the regional Fire Departments. We are looking for opportunities to work with other departments and community groups. We have participated in Emergency Management drills with the airport and other partners. Covid-19 has slowed some of our opportunities like helping Parks and Rec with their summer camps. We look forward to next year. Work continues with UCFD1, Echo FD, EUFD, and Umatilla County Dispatch to better serve the community.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & AIRPORT STAFF

Local general aviation activity and UAS activity were both up considerably from the same month in 2019. Boutique Air enplanements (outbound passengers) were up to 54% of normal last month, which is an improvement. Boutique Air also lowered its rental car prices. South County Construction (SCC) built a box hangar, which was quickly leased by a UAS company, Resolute ISR. SCC is now building three additional hangars, which will all be leased by the UAS company, who is hiring 10+ employees. The city awarded a \$2.4 million hangar bid to McCormack Construction. Phase IV UAS Industrial Park construction is ahead of schedule. A hypercar manufacturer filmed a promotional video at the airport on September 21st, which brought a world-renowned social media influencer to town. Terminal remodel is being planned for the 1st quarter of 2021. The city has drawn down almost \$3 million from the CARES Act fund, which leaves about \$14 million for other airport projects. The Atkore pipe plant received \$600,000 in flood relief from the State of Oregon to help with the rebuild

PUBLIC WORKS

Construction-related: SE Byers Avenue Reconstruction Project: The contractor is having curb & gutter constructed this week between SE 12th to SE 9th Drive. They are also working on the storm drainage system between SE 9th Drive and SE 9th Street. They will continue to work on getting the curb & gutter constructed in the coming weeks for the entire project. This work will be followed by sidewalks and paving.

2020 Overlay Project: Construction work has been completed.

Pendleton Zone 1 Levee: City staff is coordinating work with the US Army Corps of Engineers for repairs at 4 locations. Pendleton Zone 2 Levee: City staff is waiting on final materials to restore the interior drainage for the McKennon Station. City staff recently completed the interior drainage restoration for Keystone & Cor-Tek. The consultant is putting together a final report for the overall restoration of the entire levee system to previous "as-built" conditions as established by the US Army COE.

2021 Overlay Project and Urban Renewal Agency ROW Project: City staff will begin a series of weekly meetings and assignments to put together the construction considerations for next year's street projects.

Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) Industrial Park: The contractor is paving the first section of roadway from Daniel Road, located at the northern extent of the airport property, to the lift station site this week and next. Dry utility and water utility work is being completed in preparation for the rest of the roadway work to be completed. The contractor is about 1 week ahead of the October 16th roadway completion date. Overall project completion can be up to April 30, 2021.



CITY OF PENDLETON RECEIVES LEAGUE OF OREGON CITY EXCELLENCE AWARD

SALEM, Ore. – During its 95th Annual Conference Wednesday, the League of Oregon Cities (LOC) presented its 2020 Award for Excellence to the city of Pendleton for its UAS Drone Range. The award recognizes progressive and innovative city operations and services.

About the UAS Drone Range

Pendleton's City Council took an innovative approach to rural economic development when it established the drone Range. With an investment of less than \$500,000, the city developed a premier, unmanned vehicle test range that has revitalized Pendleton's World War 2-era airport, more than doubled the airport's average annual revenue, and created more than 60 high-paying aerospace jobs.

First launched in the fall of 2013, the drone range was slow to develop but took off in 2016. It has attracted more than \$5.5 million in grants and has become a major economic driver in the community. Airport ground and building rents are now nearly six times higher than they had been historically and more buildings are under construction.

For the first time in decades, the Eastern Oregon Regional Airport operates in the black and UAS range revenue will likely exceed \$1 million this fiscal year. In addition, Blue Mountain Community College, Intermountain ESD, Pendleton High School, and Sunridge Middle School have all worked closely with the UAS range to create internships and new educational opportunities.

About the League of Oregon Cities

Founded in 1925, the LOC is a voluntary association representing all 241 of Oregon's incorporated cities. The League helps city governments serve their citizens by providing legislative services, policy setting, intergovernmental relations, conferences and training, technical assistance and publications.




VOLUNTEERING DURING COVID-19



Otherwise, please complete and sign the Oregon Secretary of State's Absentee form <u>SEL 111</u> and return it to our office by mail, fax, or drop off.
