

<u>A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR</u> <u>Good News</u>

I am always a bit amused when I hear someone say "...nothing good ever happens in Pendleton." Some people seem to enjoy having a negative outlook on life. I don't understand it, but it seems to be true.

In reality, there are several good news stories happening in Pendleton that I want to share with you this month. First, we are preparing for another successful Round-Up and Happy Canyon week. I have said before in this column that the Round-Up puts Pendleton on the map and gives our city far more recognition and influence than other similar sized cities in Oregon. By the end of August, the Round-Up was recording the best ticket sales in its history, even surpassing the hugely successful Centennial year of 2010.



Next, we are getting informal messages from the Economic Development Administration (EDA) that our \$3 million grant for improving the airport infrastructure has been approved. We are still waiting for a formal announcement, but planning is already underway to build more hangars and office spaces for new clients within the test range. The city is getting ready to improve its ability to move large volumes of water up to the airport and this water will be used to support more clients at the test range and will provide downhill water for fighting fires in the west end of Pendleton. Steve Chrisman reports on-going talks with new test range customers (we have promised them we won't use their names yet) and Steve says that if we had more hangars, we would immediately have at least three major new customers. We estimate that the test range will generate about \$1 million in revenues during the current fiscal year.

We appear to be on the edge of a major breakthrough in housing. IE Construction has presented a plan to build 204 apartments on the campus of the old East Oregon Training Center, across the highway and north of EOCI. The plan also calls for a clubhouse, gym, and pool with adequate parking. The city and IE Construction are meeting to work out the details so an agreement can be taken to the City Council. Residents of this new apartment complex will be within easy walking distance to three major employers and Blue Mountain Community College. IE Construction specializes in building apartments in smaller communities and they have a proven track record for both quality of construction and project completion. Increasing the amount of affordable, decent housing in Pendleton remains one of our top goals and quiet, informal talks continue with other builders.

If you drive east past the site of the new fire station, you can see that construction is moving along nicely. This project is still on time and on budget, with an initial operating capability during the summer of 2019. Finally, after several years of intense lobbying by the law enforcement community, Pendleton is going to be home to a new state crime lab. This is a huge victory that will save us thousands of dollars each year and provide rapid crime scene analysis to the Pendleton PD.

Even the most cynical critic should be able to find something in all this to smile about!

CITY HALL RENTAL INFORMATION

VERT AUDITORIUM

The Vert Auditorium is located at the east end of the City Hall/Library complex. The auditorium seats 800 and has a 40' x 34' stage. It is the home of the Oregon East Symphony and Kiwanis Kapers, as well as many other community events.

VERT CLUB ROOM

The Vert Club Room entrance is downstairs on the 4th Street side of the Vert Auditorium. The room is 74' long x 36' wide with a fireplace and access to kitchen services. It is a versatile space that can be used for a wide variety of events, from meetings to receptions. There is a shared, warming kitchen between the Club Room and the Little Theater.

PENDLETON FOUNDATION ROOM

The Pendleton Foundation Room is located beneath the Helen McCune Gymnasium at 510 SW Dorion, on the west end of the City Hall/Library complex. Its large, open room with electric fireplace is an ideal place for meetings, receptions, or special events. It also features a bar area and kitchen.

Minimum rental is 2 hours and fees include building supervision. The room capacity when set up banquet-style is between 80 and 100, depending on the number of people at each table.

HELEN MCCUNE GYMNASIUM

Rent the gymnasium for sports practice, birthday parties, or other events. In addition to the gym floor, we have a loft full of games to keep any party fun. Feel free to bring your own music (CDs, MP3, or your phone) to really amp up the party. Please note that new iPhones without headphone jacks are not compatible with our sound system.

BIRTHDAY PARTY PROGRAM

Youth birthday parties are scheduled on Saturdays with four time blocks to choose from: 10:15 to 12:30, 12:45 to 3:00 pm, 3:15 to 5:30 pm, and 5:45 to 8:00 pm. For teen parties, please plan to provide one adult chaperone for every 15

guests. Included in your reservation are the exclusive use of the gym floor and upstairs loft. The loft includes foosball, ping pong, and pool tables, tables and chairs, and a small prep area. Many people choose to do cake and presents upstairs. The gym floor will be set up according to the age of the child and any add-ons that you have chosen. For tots, the tot time floor is set up, for older children the gym floor is set up with various activities, for teens, you can choose between an open gym set up or one of the add-ons such as NERS Wars or Glow in the Dark Dodgeball.

VOLUNTEERS Volunteering Sets Teens Up For Success

As the new school year begins many parents look for ways to support their students to help them on the path to success. Preparing nutritious meals, promoting good sleep habits, and sharing study hacks are parenting tried and true methods. Helping teens find opportunities to spend their out of school time productively is also an important factor. Engaging in volunteer activities is an excellent way to set teens up for success. Research shows there is a positive link between community service and academic performance, with students who volunteer more likely to improve their Reading, Math, Science and History scores and more likely to graduate from college than those that did not. Additionally, volunteers develop and gain job and professional skills important to employers such as communication, critical thinking, planning, and organizing.

For students looking for a way to set themselves apart when applying for college and scholarships (and if they're not, they should!) volunteering provides the opportunity to shine beyond their test scores and GPA. Increasingly admission officers place a large emphasis on community service when evaluating college applicants. Besides doing good volunteers develop a 'work resume' that can help boost chances when applying to their dream college, and often makes them eligible for certain scholarships or financial aid. Repeated or dedicated volunteer service demonstrates character that no standardized test can duplicate.

The City of Pendleton offers many opportunities for students to engage in volunteer activities throughout their departments. Volunteers work along staff to help with events, programs, and administrative tasks, and specific opportunities can be created to fit with a student's talents, interests and schedule. WHY READ A BOOK? BECAUSE IT INCREASES INTELLIGENCE!

As Dr. Seuss once wrote, "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." Diving into a good book opens up a whole world of knowledge starting from a very young age. Children's books expose kids to 50 percent more words than prime time TV, or even a conversation between college graduates, according to a <u>paper</u> from the University of California, Berkeley. Exposure to that new vocabulary not only leads to higher score on reading tests, but also <u>higher scores</u> on general tests of intelligence. Plus, stronger early reading skills <u>may mean</u>higher intelligence later in life.

A quick tip: If you're looking for a power read, opt for a traditional book. <u>Research</u> suggests that reading on a screen can slow you down by as much as 20 to 30 percent.
