Let's be Thankful

In a couple of weeks, on July 4th, the citizens of Pendleton will celebrate with a parade, picnics, and fireworks the announcement of our Declaration of Independence from Britain in Philadelphia in 1776. We will celebrate the courage it took for our ancestors to put their families' lives and personal fortunes at risk when they signed their names to the Declaration.



During the past 18 months, there has been a lot of emotion and disagreement across the United States largely because of what is happening on the political landscape. If we sometimes don't fully appreciate the many positive aspects of life in America, they certainly do.



GOATS ON THE LEVEE



This year's herd of goats have come and gone through Pendleton. The herder brought 900+ yearlings onto the west end behind EOCI and work west to east this year.

The City of Pendleton utilizes the goats as a benefit along our river and levee as goats are far more respectful of the vegetation and terrain than ma-

chines and chemicals. Herbicides seep into water and soil, affecting other vegetation, animals and humans. They also can encourage mutations among vegetation, creating greater and greater problems instead of solving them.

Goats will graze all day, going through very dense material at about a quarter acre per day per every 30 goats (estimate).

Because they have narrow, triangular mouths, they are able to crush what they eat, so seeds that might otherwise get passed through to fertilization are not viable. This is a true advantage, since machine cutting only encourages further growth in the next growth cycle.

The City of Pendleton appreciates being able to utilize the goats to preserve and help maintain our beautiful river walkway while being friendly to our environment.

PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Most of us don't think about car theft prevention until it's too late. But the fact is, learning how to prevent a car theft is knowledge you need.

Consider this: a vehicle is stolen every 44 second in the United States according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). While 50 percent are recovered, that somewhat encouraging figure doesn't tell the whole story.

If you don't want a criminal sitting behind the wheel of your car, you need to educate yourself on how to prevent car theft. This car theft prevention guide is a starting point for doing so.

Keep Track of your keys, do not leave them in the vehicle.

Secure your vehicle, close and lock windows to prevent theft.

Park intelligently in well lit secured areas.



Remove valuables, they don't belong in your vehicle. If need be, put them in the trunk.

Use a physical anti-theft device, 40% of insurance companies offer a premium discount for vehicles that have anti theft devices.

Don't leave your car running. Nearly half of all auto thefts could have been avoided if the owner turned off the car when not in use.

Take advantage of a tech-based auto recovery tool. Employing an auto-theft recov-

ery tool could help get your car back.

VOLUNTEERS

City Volunteers Honored for Service

Did you know your volunteer service can get you recognized at a national level? The City of Pendleton is a certifying organization for the President's Volunteer Service Award, a national program that recognizes the volunteer service of citizens across the United States. City volunteers who complete the required cumulative number of hours in a 12-month period are recognized with awards offered in multiple levels and designed to recognize milestones in service achievement. Levels include bronze, silver, gold, and the highest honor, the President's Lifetime Achievement Award for volunteers contributing more than 4,000 hours of service in their lifetime. In addition to the award, recipients receive a congratulatory letter from the president of the United States.

Each year the city tallies the hours of volunteers in each of our departments, and typically several city volunteers receive awards. In the recent calendar year four volunteers were recognized: Linda Senter and Linda Wagner received the Bronze Award for the service in the Library, and Sherry Zweig (Police Department) and Tikhon Gilson (Library) received the Silver Award. This was Tikhon Gilson's seventh



President's Volunteer Service Award, and with his 2,600 hours from his many years volunteering in the library he is quickly working towards the required hours to receive the President's Lifetime Achievement Award – a first for a city volunteer.

The President's Volunteer Service Award is an initiative of the Corporation for National and Community Service and is administered by Points of Light. Through a shared mission of inspiring more to answer the call to service, the President's Volunteer Service Award celebrates the impact we can all make in bettering our communities and our world.

CITY TRANSPORTATION PROGRAMS

Senior and Disabled Taxi Ticket Voucher Program

The senior and disabled taxi ticket voucher program provides rides within Pendleton and the Urban Growth boundary. The City provides rides to participants who live within seven driving miles of the City of Pendleton boundary and do not live within another transit provider agency's boundary. The taxi service provides rides 7 days a week between the hours of 5:00 am to 3:00 am daily except for holidays. The service is provided to citizens 60 years of age or older and disabled individuals. The participants pay \$2.00 for a one way ride. Limited tickets are available dependent on grant funding and are distributed among all participants on a semi-annual basis. The City distributes more tickets than funds are budgeted knowing there is a historical percentage of unused tickets quarterly. The phone number is (541) 276-8294.

Senior Meal Site Transportation Program

The senior meal site transportation program transports seniors to and from the Pendleton Senior Center five days a week for lunch. This program is on a donation basis only and it's scheduled pickups are by phone requests, (541) 276-8294.

Daily Van Service

This service runs weekdays between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm, Saturdays from 8:00 am to 5 pm, and Sunday from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm. It is a dial-a-ride program where the customer calls the taxi service in the business day before to arrange rides for the following day during the hours of operation. Same day requests will be available on a space available basis only to the general public and donations are encouraged. This service runs within the City of Pendleton and the Urban Growth boundary. \$1 per ride. Call 9:00 am and 4:00 pm to arrange the next day ride, (541) 276-6476.

Elite Transit Tickets

This service runs the 22 hours a day except for holidays. This program operates similarly to the Senior/Disabled taxi service except all general public can ride. No prequalification is necessary. Up to 6 tickets a week can be purchased at City Hall for \$3.25 per ticket. Area covered is City limits and the Urban Growth Boundary. The phone number is (541) 276-8294.

Aquatic Center Transportation

This summer service is open to the general public. A schedule of pickup times and locations around the City is provided three days a week with return service. Donations are encouraged.

Parks and Rec Interpark Transportation

This summer service provides transportation between Pendleton community parks for children to participate in group activities on a prearrangedrecreation schedule. It also provides Wednesday aquatic center rides through the parks programs. This service primarily is geared towards children but is open to the general public. Free service.

Care-Ride

With financial assistance from St. Anthony's, the City of Pendleton provides free taxi service for any person who needs prompt medical attention but does not require the specialized care and immediate response of an ambulance. The individual may call the taxi company at (541) 276-8294 direct for a free ride to the emergency room and back. If a doctor needs to see a patient immediately for a non-routine emergency call, the doctor's office can call to schedule a free ride for the patient to the doctor's office and back.

The City contracts with Elite Taxis, Inc. for these services.


The City provides rides to all individuals regardless of age, income, or disabilities. The City provides access with three City/State owned wheelchair accessible vehicles along with taxis owned by the taxi contractor. All individuals are afforded the rides on the same order of calls, "first call, first ride" priority regardless of disabilities unless the wheelchair accessible vehicle is in current use and a taxi is not accessible by the individual.




TAKE STEPS TO PROTECT AGAINST TICKS

Taking steps to protect yourself and your family from getting a tick bite is the best defense against Lyme disease and other tick-borne infections. Whether you're working, enjoying your yard, camping, hiking, hunting or otherwise in the outdoors, CDC recommends that people:

- Avoid areas with high grass and leaf litter and walk in the center of trails when hiking.
- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, or 2-undecanone. EPA's helpful search tool can help you find the product that best suits your needs. Always follow product instructions.
- Use products that contain permethrin to treat clothing and gear, such as boots, pants, socks and tents or look for clothing pre-treated with permethrin.
- Treat dogs for ticks. Dogs are very susceptible to tick bites and to some tickborne diseases. They may also bring ticks into your home. Talk to your veterinarian about the best tick prevention products for your dog.
 - Bathe or shower as soon as possible after coming indoors to wash off and more easily find crawling ticks before they bite you.



• Conduct a full-body tick check using a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body upon returning from tick-infested areas. Parents should help children check thoroughly for ticks. Remove any ticks right away.

"America's Night Out Against Crime"

Neighborhoods throughout Pendleton are invited to join over 38 million neighbors across approximately 16 thousand communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, and military bases worldwide on **August 7th, 2018**, the first Tuesday of August, for National Night Out. National Night Out is nationally sponsored by National Association of Town Watch (NATW), Dietz and Watson, Ring, Package Guard, and co-sponsored locally by The Pendleton Police Department.

National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, more caring places to live. Together, we are making that happen.

In years past, the Pendleton Police Department has hosted National Night Out parties at local venues. This year, we are moving this community event back into the community and into your neighborhood. From 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. on August 7th, neighbors throughout Pendleton and across the nation are asked to lock their doors, turn on their front porch lights, and spend the evening outside with neighbors and law enforcement.

As National Night Out also coincides with the regularly scheduled Pendleton City Council meeting, this year, with the cooperation of Pendleton Mayor John Turner, the Pendleton City Council Meeting will take place the following Tuesday so that City Council Members may participate in this event in their various wards and neighborhoods.

Pendleton Police Department is grateful for help from our many community partners, which include Hill Meat, Franz Bakery, Walmart, Safeway, Pendleton Parks and Recreation, the City of Pendleton Library, Pendleton City Council and Mayor Turner, as well as many other agencies, businesses, and support entities who help make this an amazing night for our community.

To help you in planning your Pendleton National Night Out event, the Pendleton Police and Pendleton Parks and Recreation Departments are coordinating to provide locations at City Parks to hold your neighborhood party. The Pendleton Aquatic Center, a division of Parks and Rec, is also donating free day passes to the PAC for those organizing a party. These passes are to be given to your party attendees, but cannot be raffled or sold. In addition, Hill Meat, Franz Bakery, and other local sponsors are working with PPD to provide some supplies for your party! Pendleton Police and our many community partners will also be assisting with various activities at community party sites on this night.

Additionally, plans are in the works for a Coloring Contest, as are presentations at registered parties, co-sponsored by the Pendleton City Library, Pendleton Fire Department, and other community partners.
