

A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Challenges and Progress

As we enter the season for building next year's budget, we will become increasingly focused on how to spend our limited resources. The City's PERS obligation remains the biggest drag on the budget. In the coming 2020-2021 Fiscal Year, it is anticipated that the City will need to spend hundreds of thousands of additional dollars on PERS. You have



read previously in this column that the City Council is also determined to spend more money on the repair of streets, water lines, and buildings. There is never a shortage of requests for funding other worthy projects, whether it be from our public safety leaders, the Downtown Association, home builders, the industrial park, or civic groups.

There are a few bright sources of new revenues for our budget. The airport and its UAS range continue to make a turnaround. For at least the next fiscal year, the legislature has provided the resources to pay the salaries of our test range leaders. As the state dollars begin to recede, the revenues from the range will be used to replace them. We continue to recruit new customers and the fees they pay to use the range and rent hangars and offices will be plowed back into placing the UAS range on a solid financial footing. At some point in the future, we expect the airport to pay off its debt and contribute to the City's general fund, but that will have to wait until we are positive that the range is self-sustaining.

Much has been said about the unexpected windfall of taxes from marijuana sales. Suffice it to say that the City will have no problem spending this money on the myriad of needs that are already present. The City has a good track record of winning grants from both the State and Federal governments, and more applications are in the works.

On a positive note, progress is evident. Our new fire station will break ground in May. New houses and duplexes are popping up around town, and our planners talk to interested builders on a weekly basis. The 8th Street Bridge construction will finally begin this spring, along with new water line projects. Tourism remains strong. Progress is always slower than we would like, but we are indeed making progress.

Again, on behalf of the City Council and all of us who work for the City of Pendleton, I want to express our gratitude to the many volunteers who work on our various boards, commissions, and committees. Your contributions are the key to our progress and our quality of life.

PENDLETON MOURNS THE LOSS OF COUNCILOR JOHN BRENNE



Mr. Brenne was the longest-serving member of the council having first been elected in 1978. This was his 40^{th} year as a council member.

Mr. Brenne served on many committees while serving on the City Council. Most recently he was involved in the Affordable Housing Program, the Design and Development Committee which made recommendations on the architectural design of the new fire station, the Library Board, the Budget Committee, Housing and Neighborhood Improvement, Pendleton Development Commission, PDC

Goal 2 Committee, and the Transportation Committee.

A fierce advocate for seniors and low-income citizens, Mr. Brenne served as the Executive Director of the Foster Grandparents Program in Pendleton. He was the Project Director of the Senior Companion Program.

As his forty years of service would suggest, he was tirelessly dedicated to the City of Pendleton, and had recently filed to run for another term of office. He could be counted on to be diligent in all that he undertook, and was not slow to volunteer to do more. While not afraid to ask the hard questions, Councilor Brenne was always kind, respectful, and a true gentleman. Mayor John Turner called John Brenne "a warm-hearted individual who always encouraged the Council to consider the human side effects of its decisions."

Mr. Brenne was a great asset to our City Council and to our community and will be truly missed.

More than 3,400 communities have made the commitment to becoming a Tree City USA. They have achieved Tree City USA status by meeting four core standards of sound urban forestry management: maintaining a tree board or department, having a community tree ordinance, spending **TREE CITY USA** at least \$2 per capita on urban forestry and celebrating Arbor Day.

When you check out a book at the Pendleton Public Library, at the bottom of your check out slips, there is information sharing with you how much you saved by checking out the book as opposed to purchasing the book.

According to Google, if your book is a 375-page novel, it's reasonable to ask \$16.95 for it. Most average-sized trade paperback novels fall into the \$13.95 to \$17.95 price range. That being said, this range is true for most books.

An avid reader has the opportunity to save hundreds of dollars in a year utilizing the public library. And if you are a family of readers, the savings could really add up quickly!

If you would like to report a street light outage, you may do so by filing a report <u>here</u> on the City's website, or at the Building Department at City Hall.


Sidewalks
