A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

What's In The Budget for 2017-2018?

Our new fiscal year begins on July 1st and it looks like we have enough revenues to provide robust city services We put more money into the area of next vear. infrastructure improvement, which is one of the city's four main goals. No programs had to be cut, in spite of the considerable increase in the amount of money the

city pays for its PERS obligations. The Airport with its UAV Test Range is a major new player in Pendleton's economy. Test range fees and revenues from renting our facilities are becoming significant. Let's take a look at some specific areas:

Public Works: This means roads, water and sewer lines. The city has taken advantage of a state low interest loan program to get a \$14.8 million line of credit to fix water lines. We have about 33 miles of water lines that are nearing 100 years of age. We have enough revenue from fees to borrow about \$5 million per year for three years to be used for water line projects.

We are coordinating our street improvement efforts with ODOT and you can expect to see the Westgate road from the Convention Center to the freeway completely resurfaced by the middle of July (just before the concert and Bike Week). We just approved a contract for the slurry sealing of 80 blocks of city streets. Last year we spent about \$800,000 on our streets and this year we **CITY OF PENDLETON** budgeted \$1.8 million for street repairs.

Facilities: The work load on our Facilities Department has been strong enough to justify hiring another worker in 2017-18. You can expect to see facilities improvements at City Hall, the Library and the Vert. The Convention Center started the past two fiscal years in the red, but in FY 2017 -18, it will start with an estimated \$184,000 in beginning working capital. Almost \$60,000 in repairs are planned for the Convention Center in the coming year in addition to roof repairs of about \$124,000.

Capital Equipment: This coming year's budget has money for replacing some worn-out equipment. The Police Department is getting 3 new patrol vehicles and Parks and Rec will get a new truck.

Summary: We know we need to put more money into repairs of our streets, water lines, and buildings. In the coming year, you will see a lot of work going on. More needs to be done in coming years

DOWNTOWN URBAN RENEWAL PROGRAM

Pendleton is eager to help your business thrive!

Our downtown urban renewal program provides financial and consulting support, whether you're starting a business, expanding your business or getting a building ready for business. Downtown includes a wide swath of Pendleton running along the Umatilla River. Businesses locating or already located within the downtown urban renewal area are eligible to apply for help.

Check out these programs to help your business in the Pendleton Urban Renewal District. Keep in mind that you might be able to use multiple programs to get maximum financial support for your project.

The **Jump-Start program** provides many benefits including free business consulting and low-cost loans beginning as low as 1%. Benefits are available for both building owners and new or existing business own-ers/operators.

If you own a building or plan to buy one for your business, the Façade **Restoration program** could provide you with grants—that's right, no repayment necessary. Grants in this program can be used to restore or upgrade the exterior of your building. Projects can be as simple as a paint job or complex as a complete façade renovation.

Let's say you buy a failing building that's not restorable. You just want to demolish and re-build. We've got grant funding for your **demolition project**.

Do you own a building in Pendleton's downtown urban renewal district but can't fully utilize the upper floors? Grants are available for **second story renovation**. Interested in learning more?

THANK YOU PENDLETON!

The Mayor, City Council, and City leaders want to thank Pendleton's voters for approving the bond levy to build a new fire station.

The new station will better accommodate modern fire and ambulance equipment, will have adequate sleeping quarters for our female fire fighters, police precinct office and will have room for on-site training. In addition, some vital life-saving equipment will be purchased. The site of the new station will be the western third of the old St. Anthony hospital on East Court and response times overall will be slightly faster for the average 911 call.

The voters have chosen to invest in improving Pendleton's public safety. We believe it will take about two years to purchase the property, select an architect, plan the new station, hire a general contractor and complete construction. We intend to build a structure that will last for most of the rest of the century.

The wording on the award read:

Over a two-year period, you visited every one of the included school districts and completed environmental threat assessments for every school building. You held security work sessions with school administrators in order to adopt and revise district-wide emergency plans and you assisted districts with behavioral threat assessments including the identification of concerning student behaviors, tracking and sharing information and engaging community partners in safety planning.

The success of the School Security Initiative is a direct result of your dedication to community safety and collaboration in rural communities throughout Eastern Oregon. Due to your efforts, school districts have access to evaluation tools, resources, and training, schools are more secure and the 14,000 young students from Kindergarten through 12th grade in the region are safer.


