A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

"Let's Celebrate Our Victories"

During my 28 years in the Marine Corps, I lived all over the U.S. and in Europe and Asia. When I moved to Pendleton in the summer of 2003, I immediately recognized that there was something different, something special about this town that I had not experienced in the other places I had lived. Part of this can be explained by our quality of life: you can drive across town in just a few minutes without traffic jams; graffiti is rare; parks are well-kept; the streets are free of trash, and the violent crime rate is lower. I met a lot of young couples who had moved back to Pendleton to raise their children.



The other day, I was reflecting on how many great things had happened in our town just since I arrived here. A partial list includes:

A new hospital

Expansion of the Round-Up grandstands

New roof and mezzanine for Happy Canyon

A skateboard park

Renovated and expanded Convention Center

New facades and building renovations downtown

The overpass leading from Court Street to Westgate

The Pendleton Bronze Trail

Major renovations and new buildings at both BMCC and the PSD

We are the most solarized city per capita in Oregon

Our access to high-speed fiber is unrivaled in Oregon

More good things are on the way:

The UAV test range has the airport finances in the black, with new revenues coming. The Pendleton Downtown Association is working with the Pendleton Development Commission to make our downtown core more attractive and prosperous.

We are investing more money in street and infrastructure repair.

The 8th Street Bridge will be replaced.

Westgate will be repayed from the Convention Center to the freeway.

Tourism is growing, largely due to new events.

Much work remains to be done:

We need more housing.

We need to invest even more in street repairs.

Aging water and sewer lines need replacing.

Our airport infrastructure needs improvements for our burgeoning UAV test range.

Your City Council and our professional staff are working hard to make sound decisions that will serve us well into the future. There is tremendous promise for the City of Pendleton, and we also have significant challenges to meet.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT

With financial assistance from St. Anthony's, the City of Pendleton provides free taxi service for any person needing prompt medical attention but does not require the specialized care and immediate response of an ambulance.



An individual may call the taxi company at 276-8294 direct for a free ride to the emergency room and back.

If a doctor needs to see a patient immediately for a non-routine emergency call, the doctor's office can call to schedule a free ride for the patient to the doctor's office and back.

The City provides rides to all individuals regardless of age, income, or disabilities. The City provides access with three City/State owned wheelchair accessible vehicles along with taxis owned by the taxi contractor. All individuals are afforded the rides on the same order of calls, "first call, first ride" priority regardless of disabilities unless the wheelchair accessible vehicle is in current use and a taxi is not accessible by the individual.

UTILITY BILLING FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The City of Pendleton is offering a discount program for income eligible households on their water and sewer utility services. This discount does not apply to any additional fees including, but not limited to safety or street utility fee. The program will be administered through HELPING HANDS and is voluntary. If you choose to apply for this assistance you will need to provide all required information during the application process.

Please make an appointment with HELPING HANDS at 541-276-3418 to determine if you are eligible.

PUBLIC WORKS

Oregon Law requires that anyone digging in private property or any public right-of-way call the One-Call Center prior to digging. Everyone, contractor and homeowner alike, must call two business days prior to digging. After the call is received, the One-Call Center will notify all affected operators. The operators then have two business days to locate and accurately mark their underground facilities using color-coded paint.

Volunteer Coaches Support Youth

Just as March Madness builds around the country, the City's Recreation Department completed another season of youth basketball for grades 1-6. Under the direction of 20 volunteer coaches from the community, the Youth Basketball Program yielded 26 teams of 255 boys and girls. Coaches worked with boys 3rd-6th grade in the first part of the season, and started girls and "Lil Bucks" after the holidays, practicing team work, ball handling, and rules of the game. More than just learning skills, research shows that children who participate in youth sports are less likely to drop out of school, become involved in substance abuse, and are more likely to excel in academics and social skills. The importance of the availability of programs like the Youth Basketball Program in a community is directly related to the success of youth.


ISPRING BREAK STAYCATION!
