A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

As we all get used to writing "2017" on our documents, there is also a feeling that something new is in the air. We continue to appreciate the solid foundation provided by our outgoing mayor and city councilors, while we welcome a new city council made up of experienced leaders and administrators.

I moved into my new office this past week, and during that process I could not help but reflect on the many great things that are happening in Pendleton. The Chamber of Commerce started a new *Leadership Pendleton* class last week and will host the *First Citizens Banquet* on January 20th. The Pendleton Downtown Association works hard to improve our downtown core while *Travel Pendleton* is working with other key partners to bring more tourism to town. At the top of the list is the UAS range and events at the airport. Revenues from the UAS test range have changed the entire perspective of the airport, moving it from a money loser into a profit center. Within a year there should be sufficient money flowing into the UAS test range that we can start financing some infrastructure upgrades needed to improve the range facilities and invest in better utility services for the industrial park.

Boutique Airlines picked the most difficult December weather in a dozen years to begin operations at the airport, but their planes have been mostly full. Their CEO even made a recent change to their refund policy, so if you were scheduled to fly and your flight got canceled due to weather, you may be eligible for a refund.

I want to thank our hard-working City employees for their professionalism during the recent period of sustained snow and cold weather. Some citizens, especially those who live on steep hills, have complained about the condition of their streets, but far more citizens have mentioned their admiration and respect for the long hours our City employees have worked to sand streets, fix frozen water lines, move snow, and provide normal City services. I don't know about you, but I am tired of shoveling snow off my driveway and am looking forward to warmer temperatures!

I also want to thank the dozens of citizen volunteers who support the City by serving on our numerous boards, commissions, and committees. In the next couple of months, the Fire Chief and I will be going to quite a few service clubs and civic organizations to talk about the need for a new fire station. During the first City Council meeting of 2017, William Perkinson, newly appointed Municipal Court Judge, had the honor to swear in Mayor John Turner, as well as two new council members, Dale Primmer and Scott Fairley.

Mayor Turner served as a Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1975-2003. He was President of Blue Mountain Community College, 2004-2013. He comes with much community involvement experience Port Commissioner, Port of



Umatilla 2008-2016, Round Up City Development Corporation 2004-2016, Rotary Club of Pendleton 2003-2016, Oregon Solutions Convener for Pendleton Housing 2011, Columbia River Umatilla Solutions Team member 2010, Umatilla Army Depot Local Reuse Authority 2008-2014, Pendleton Housing Study Chairman 2016, Past Chairman of the Oregon Community College Association Board, Blue Mountain Community College Foundation –ex officio member.

Mayor Turner is married to Gail. They have a son, Barrett, who is married to Beth and a daughter, Hayley.



Dale Primmer elected council member representing Ward III.

Mr. Primmer is the Director of Umatilla County Community Justice (adult and juvenile Parole and Probation Departments). Once graduated from Western Oregon University, he was hired by Umatilla County Community Corrections as a Community Service Work Crew Supervisor. Over the years he was promoted through various Parole and Probation Officer positions as well as management until filling the role as Director in July of 2015. Dale and his wife Brenda were married in 1998 after dating through both high school and college. They have one son, Alex who is 15 and one daughter, Aleece who is 12.



Scott Fairley elected council member representing Ward II.

Mr. Fairley is the Eastern Regional Solutions Coordinator for the Governor's Office. 
