NEW MAIN STREET BUSINESSES

From art to flowers, backpacking to wine, all are winners

When you start a new business, you're never quite sure how it will go. But just the simple pleasure of being your own boss and having more control over your own time was a winner for Emily LeValle. LeValle, the founder of a new downtown Pendleton retailer, was also a winner in the first ever *Path to Success* Business Plan Competition. She opened The Studio Pendleton, LLC, in time for the Round-Up this past September.

The *Path to Success* competition is part of the Pendleton Development Commission's Jump Start program, helping to grow new businesses in Pendleton. With the launch of *Path to Success* in July, 2022, the PDC offered applicants a possible \$20,000 forgivable loan along with mentor support intended to make their business successful and contribute to a vibrant downtown economy. Over the next two years, a quarter of the loan will be forgiven every six months, as long as they follow the contract requirements.

But there have also been challenges for Ms. LeValle. "I'm just one person and I have 20 things to do on my list and what do I do first?" she asked. "It's very different from teaching, where I had lesson plans and it was the same thing every day. Now I'm juggling working the books, checking out samples and ordering supplies."

Ryan Smith, who opened Pendleton Outfitters just across Main Street from The Studio Pendleton, views marketing and promotion as a big challenge and opportunity. "The biggest challenge has been getting the word out, finding the right medium to reach our prospective customers. We've tried to cast a wide net about our downtown location and we've begun to reach out online," says Smith.

He describes his marketing strategies as a moving target. "A lot of the gear and products we're offering are seasonal in nature." But he has found help from his downtown community. "The Chamber of Commerce did an excellent ribbon cutting for us, the following week the Pendleton Downtown Association put on their first-ever Sip and Shop Event, which brought in a lot of people. I feel like we've got backing from our friends in the community and it's been great in the first couple of weeks here."

Robb Zimmel, Cerebella Winery and Tasting Room, is following the strategy of marketing to wine club members while also maintaining retail sales from his downtown Pendleton tasting room.

"We're starting to get the members here of course, but also from Colorado, Idaho, North Dakota, Minnesota . . . we're starting to expand quite a bit." He also is seeking some small, unique mementos from local makers that he can include in his wine club shipments. He said he loves Pendleton and wants to include something that speaks of his hometown source. He's also thrilled to be in his tasting room and like the fly on the wall, listening to the positive comments about his wines, which have won a number of awards at competitions.

On opening day in early December, Terri Leetch, owner of Buttercup Barley's Flowers & Gifts, was excited over a multitude of good feelings. "Just everything, just getting going, starting from scratch, finally seeing it come together . . . it's just really fun." What's she learned from her new business? "How expensive everything is! And trying to get all the goods in and it's taking so long for the goods to arrive, even the simplest things. I still have things coming." She mentioned that weather problems in California have interfered with her flower deliveries. But the excitement is real



said the longtime florist. She's had her delivery issues, "But it's coming along and it's getting better."

Robb Zimmel, Cerebella Winery, 30-34 SW Emigrant Ave: A downtown business with a focus on bottled wine sales via a tasting room, wine club memberships and regional distribution. Cerebella Winery will include a restaurant, classroom, retail space and scheduled events.

Background Through the Small Business Development Center at Blue Mountain Community College, participants were offered free business planning classes and access to a business plan development tool. A panel of judges then chose eight semi-finalists from the 32 applicants. Those eight were tasked with writing their business plans and presenting them to the judges in one-hour presentations.

The original plan allowed for three winners of \$20,000 each in a forgivable loan, but the panel had trouble narrowing down the eight semi-finalists to three and selected four winners.

All four of these final presenters had excellent business concepts, polished business plans, capital beyond the prize that the PDC was offering, and passion and experience for the business category they are pursuing. All of them have already shown initiative in finding a location, all four on Main Street. Not only will they bring unique businesses to downtown, they will also fill currently vacant storefronts, reducing our storefront vacancy rate.

The PDC believes the Path to Success Program has been a good example meeting our Goal of increasing the vitality of Pendleton's downtown. We look forward to continuing working with these four new businesses in downtown Pendleton and look forward to the next year's competition for entrepreneurs, starting in the spring, 2023.

STAFF ACTIVITY REPORT NOVEMBER 2022

FINANCE

Finance is still working with audit. The Auditor is understaffed and has many commitments. The audit will most likely require an extension with the State due to staffing needs. Linda is still trying to wrap up the GASB 87 lease entries.

Finance has hired a new municipal court staff member, Shelby House. Shelby came to us on October 31st and is being trained by Lisette our lead court staff member.

Finance is gearing up for year-end items such as 1099's and W-2's to go out timely. We will also be processing dog license applications and renewal of business license applications.

Transit is in the middle of applications for funding for the next two fiscal years. That takes a lot of time and Karen Kendall is heading up the application process. Linda sits on the County Oversight committee for the County wide applications. They will be meeting next week to make recommendations. We hope to have a new ADA van on the site within the next few weeks. The City Transit committee is meeting November 29th.

PENDLETON CONVENTION CENTER

We are hosting several large events at PCC. The Pendleton Leather Show had the largest attendance in the event's history. It is now produced by Burns Saddlery of Salina, UT. Brayden and Misty Shaw own Burns Saddlery and manage the show. Classes for makers begin on November 1 and are complete on November 5. The show is Friday, November 4th and Saturday November 5. Vendors came from as far as Florida and there were 50 vendors with booths. There were 300 students for the classes and over 2000 attendees for the trade show.

The Pendleton Wrestling Club hosted the largest youth wrestling tournament in the United States on that weekend. There were 800 youth athletes competing and over 2500 attendees. The Convention Center caterer had their largest single day of concessions at \$10,000.00.

The Altrusa Bazaar saw fewer vendors but larger attendance this year with an estimated 2000 holiday shoppers. This a one our long-standing partnerships with a community group. It creates funds for Alturas's beneficiaries.

Our next large event is St. Anthony's Festival of the Trees.

Pendleton Catering Company is continuing to work with our customers and create new customers for the Convention Center too. They are a great partner and a great fit for the Convention Center. We are seeing an upsurge of holiday parties with 12 booked with catering. Pendleton Catering sold out of 25 take home, precooked Thanksgiving family meals they offered, and they are now advertising Christmas meals and likely will sell out those meals too.

THE VERT THEATER

A Sharp Painter has begun painting the theater and lobby and will complete the project before the Oregon East Symphony's holiday presentation on December 11th. This project is funded with American Rescue Act dollars. Next will be upgrading the HVAC system to a series of heat pumps and "mini – splits" in the office spaces and Club Room.

Homeless campers are continuing to harm the Vert with gang graffiti and dumping. Recently a fire was started in the Club Room kitchen stairwell. It was within 1 foot of a wooden door, but it did not catch on fire. Drug use, mostly fentanyl is being done in all the stairwells and in the hidden areas. Our police department is aware and educates us not to touch tin foil without gloves for fear of contact with fentanyl residue. During a family event in the Club Room someone gang tagged the stairwell to the boiler room which was very near the lower entrance to the Vert.

Due the unsafe nature of activity by homeless campers and drug user utilizing the Vert I am gathering bids for a security camera system and fencing to create a safety barrier for the building.

Event bookings at the Vert continue to grow.

THE UAS RANGE

The UAS Range continues to be very busy with over 3,000 UAS operations in October, and over 20,000 UAS operations from Jan 1-Oct 31 2022. The range invoiced 19 individual customers in October, and we are signing new clients monthly.

The range recently kicked off our partnership with engineering/fabrication company SigmaDesign. SigmaDesign has established a machine shop in Range Headquarters at the airport; the capability that SigmaDesign brings to the range will be valuable to UAS clients looking for a 'one-stop shop' to do manufacturing as well as flight test.

PARKS AND RECREATION

A study published by the National Park and Recreation Association found that 84% of people see high quality park and recreation when choosing a place to live.

Parks

A clogged restroom at Brownfield park that crews could not resolve led to a call to a plumbing company. The line was found to be clogged with everything from socks to large amounts of tin foil (suspected to be from drug use). This clog was similar in nature to the one discovered at Til Taylor park recently. Issues like this make public bathrooms comparatively expensive facilities to operate.

Recreation

The Parks crew have been working to get the ice rink up and running for the year. This includes the project above where crews are running a new water line to replace one that has broken under the concrete slab and needed to be abandoned.

Aquatics

The recent wind storm did some fairly severe damage to the aquatic center roof. After closing down the pool a large return pipe from the dive pool was found to be severely rusted and will need to be replaced which will be another fairly major project.

Cemetery

The new cemetery payment system that is linked to the new cemetery software is now fully operational and has been used on multiple transactions. This new software should increase the clarity and accessibility of our financial records.


