Uber and Elite Taxi



In late January, the City Council was asked by a small group of Uber drivers if we would approve a change to the City's Taxi Ordinance to allow "ride-sharing" services like Uber to operate in Pendleton. For the most part, Uber or Lyft don't operate in rural America because small towns don't usually match up well with their business model. The local Uber drivers are convinced, however, that they could successfully operate in Pendleton alongside our current taxi provider, Elite Taxi.

Pendleton has a Taxi Ordinance that awards a contract for taxi services to a company that guarantees operations for 22 hours a day/ 365 days a year. Any taxi company could successfully operate during the few weeks each year when our city is flooded with tourists. The Taxi Ordinance intends to ensure we have reliable taxi services available in the late night and early morning hours during the entire year. The City of Pendleton also contracts with Elite Taxi to provide drivers for our *Let er Bus* public transportation program and our *Dial a Ride* program. Elite also provides service to customers who use the City's taxi tickets and they serve customers who need some kind of ADA service, such as a wheelchair-accessible vehicle. Elite Taxi has held the taxi contract (without much competition) for the past four decades. They have both loyal fans and some dissatisfied customers alike.

On the 8th of February, the City Council held a work session to examine the idea of allowing Uber to work in Pendleton. Both the Uber drivers and Elite Taxi took part in the discussions and both parties agreed that, under certain conditions, they could operate together. I was very impressed by both sides' willingness to work out a compromise arrangement. City staff will help facilitate discussions on how the two parties can work together and figure out how the City's taxi ordinance might be amended to allow this to happen. We will probably have a six-month pilot program to see if our compromise actually works and then re-examine our transportation options. I think this whole taxi-related affair is an excellent example of a local government working with business owners and individuals to solve problems or provide new opportunities.

FROM THE CITY MANAGER

The Pendleton Children's Center received a gift of the Pendleton Senior Center, which closed its doors for reasons unknown. The City will support PCC any way we can. For many years The City supported the Pendleton Senior Center by paying their property insurance because they asked for our help.

The Aquatic Center saw an increase in attendance over the summer. Recreation Supervisor Jeff Hamilton provided an overview of the 2021 season to Council updating them on how the facility operated. The pool opened early in 2021 to accommodate the Pendleton Swim Association, which did not have local access to a pool since the closing of BMCC pool. Staff worked hard at the aquatic center putting in over 184 hours (combined) each day workday.

A fun side note, the aquatic center invested in a soft-serve ice cream machine which paid for itself in 2021. The concession stand sold 6,311 ice cream cones, paying for the machine in one summer!

The concession stand increased by its sales by \$25,601 in 2021. Revenue minus expenses were up \$13,665.

A bus storage facility is scheduled to be built up at the airport to house the buses used for local transportation, which will be paid for by the State of Oregon. This grant-funded program will allow employees to have access to restrooms, breakrooms, and other amenities.

Thousands of people utilize local transportation services through the City's transportation program, we need a sheltered space for the vehicles, to protect them from elements and extend their life cycle.

PENDLETON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The Pendleton Convention Center hosted the First Citizen's Banquet on January 28th. Two City Council Members, Carole Innes and Jake Cambier, were named Woman and Man of the Year, and the City received a Tourism Excellence Award for the "Get Wild In Pendleton" Summer Campaign. Not



too shabby for a City that once had a not-so-business-friendly reputation. Pendleton is now very pro-growth and very pro-business.

As of April 2021, over 1,000 restaurants had permanently closed in Oregon, and that number is likely higher now. Pendleton lost none, which was due in great part to the tireless efforts of the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce and Charles Denight, Associate Director of Pendleton Development Commission.

The COVID period has been devastating to small business, particularly lodging and hospitality. The Chamber Staff and Charles relentlessly hunted down and promoted every financial assistance opportunity that was out there tohelp keep our businesses alive...and it worked. Many towns were not so forward-thinking and they are now paying the price. The belief has always been that the American downtowns that stayed vibrant and busy would undoubtedly be the fastest to recover, and even grow. That is being proven out by the continued development of new second story lodging downtown and the new SEARS Homegrown store going into the former JC Penney's space on Main Street. The Moto Lodge, formerly Knight's Inn, is under renovation using a local company, McCormack Construction.

The Airport Radisson Hotel and Restaurant should open in May 2022, also being built by McCormack Construction.

There has been steady investor/developer interest in other hotels, housing developments, and the redevelopment of older commercial buildings in the downtown.

A new childcare facility is making great strides and was recently gifted the old Senior Center, which will help boost available workforce.

Pendleton Bike Week is coming back this summer, and Backfire Station and Moto Lodge have discussed new events that could bring many new adventure bike riders to town in the coming years.

The City is also submitting a Good Jobs Challenge grant to the Economic Development Administration to accelerate the training of local workforce.

AIRPORT UPDATE

The airport has been in the construction and project planning state of mind in January. We've been working closely with our engineering firm and the



FAA to get the Runway 29 Hot Spot Mitigation Project designed and through the necessary process for construction later this year. We finalized the design and construction bid for the Terminal Remodel Project that the City Council approved at their February 1st meeting. We also received word from the

FAA that our next AIP Project after the Runway 29 project has received funding which is great news for the airport.

Boutique had a difficult January managing the bad weather – whether it was snow, freezing fog or low visibility (here and in Portland), the winter weather forced more flight cancellations than we normally see. Fortunately, the weather has been nice for the last few days and their operations are on track. Boutique is also looking for qualified Customer Service Representatives to run their counter operations here at the airport. It's a good part-time job that comes with travel benefits.

Beacon of the Sentinels, Pendleton's Military Tribute

When the crew from Denver slid the 12-foot, 1-inch diameter bolts through the massive basalt columns, the threaded steel shafts slid perfectly into the 3-foot holes drilled into the concrete foundation two weeks earlier. Such was the experience of installing Pendleton's new \$150,000 military tribute in July 2021. It went very smoothly despite the tension of the weeks prior.

It took an entire community—not to mention sources outside the community—to finally put the *Beacon of the Sentinels* in place. That was the name given to the military tribute by nationally recognized artist Michael Clapper. The artist, from Denver, had been selected in a process unfolding over several months that began in May 2018, when members of the Pendleton Arts Commission began looking for artists.

But the push for a military tribute began a year earlier in March 2017, when Johnny Blagg, a member of Pendleton VFW Let'er Buck Post 922, approached the Arts Commission for funding. Blagg, who would be drawn into a years-long process, began with a concept for bronze medallions and basalt columns that would honor the US military's five services. Then he joined the Arts Commission. And ultimately, his quest led to a much larger project.

By December 2019, the Arts Commission had solicited qualifications from artists in the US and Canada who had experience with public art. Americans for the Arts, a national arts non-profit, had a robust system of distributing requests for qualifications to artists. Over two dozen artists responded. From New York to Texas, Chicago to Los Angeles, artists shipped their stories of public artworks to Pendleton.

By February 2020, three finalists had been selected. The three, James Dinh and Jeanine Centuori of Los Angeles, and Michael Clapper, were invited to Pendleton, where they were escorted through Pendleton and Umatilla County, exposing them to the awesome geography from the Blues to the Columbia. They were also booked to provide presentations to

art classes at Pendleton High School.

Of the three, James Dinh initially looked the strongest to the Arts Commission. He had just been selected as a finalist for the Native American Veterans Memorial at the National Museum of the American Indian on the Washington Mall. Members of the Pendleton Arts Commission loved the design. And Dinh was a landscape designer turned public artist. His work would enhance the small public park that was to become the site of the military tribute. *(continued on next page)*

But ultimately the Arts Commissioners selected Michael Clapper. Following the visit to Pendleton, the three artists were assigned to design the art they would propose for Pendleton. Each submitted their designs. Clapper's came closest to a concept that honored all the military branches, which fit the initial concept of three years earlier. His design also was judged best in taking advantage of the existing park design.

Once the art was selected, the Arts Commission tackled fundraising. Sources varied from a local foundation to a regional foundation and included an award of a nearly \$40,000 veterans memorial grant from the Oregon Parks Department. The Pendleton Development Commission also contributed. Finally, the Arts Commission opened up its fundraising to the entire community, selling anyone the opportunity to engrave a name on a memorial brick at the site. To date over 200 individuals, organizations and businesses have contributed \$44,000 to the brick fundraising campaign. The bricks will be installed at the site beginning this April. Bricks will continue to be available for purchase at www.pendletontribute.com.

In July 2021, Michael Clapper and his crew showed up from Denver, simultaneously with a truck delivering the steel towers and another with the tall basalt columns so carefully drilled straight down their middles. At the same time, a local crane operator took up a position to be able to move the massive stone columns, steel towers, and other components of the Beacon. Over several days the pieces came together. Finally, the art concept that had excited the local art enthusiasts of the Arts Commission was in place and ready to receive admirers.

The *Beacon of the Sentinels* is located in what the Arts Commission has begun calling Beacon Park, a small park at the east end of Pendleton where Hwy 11 comes down the hill, just before it reaches SE Court Avenue. Members of the Arts Commission and the VFW are excited about the chance to share this art with the community, commemorating the service of all those who have ever served in any branch of America's amazing military.


