#### A YEAR OF GROWTH FOR PENDLETON PARKS AND REC

Working every day to be the premier city in Eastern Oregon looks different for all of our City of Pendleton departments. For Parks and Recreation, this means offering equitable, enriching, and diverse programs and events for our community. We strive to adapt and provide the activities that Pendleton is looking for. We've seen some significant changes over the course of the last few years, most of which have proven to be beneficial. We are excited to shed some light on some of the great things we are doing at the Rec Center.

Administration: As some of you may know, we have recently moved our Recreation Administrative team to the Recreation Center office. For many years, we were housed out of our Parks and Cemetery office on Tutuilla Road. As you can imagine, that led to some uncomfortable juxtaposition between one family having conversations regarding end of life celebrations while there is a family a few feet away signing up for Tee Ball. By moving any and all recreation registrations, questions, and administrative work to the Rec Center, we not only eliminate that discomfort for the public, but also bring life back to our historic Helen McCune Gym. We are very pleased with the benefits that our entire department has experienced since making the change.

After School Program: Another major adjustment we have made in 2022 is moving our After School Program, ASP, to the Recreation Center. Since the beginning of this program in 2019, the location has bounced around between the different elementary schools. We started with a program site at all four schools, however, due to COVID and difficulty finding and keeping adequate staff, we were down to serving all four schools but only using two sites at the end of the 2022-2023 school year. That, in conjunction with our coordinator trying to build and maintain a program split between two places, helped guide our decision to bring the entire ASP to the Rec Center and it has been an extremely successful shift. Our staff has been incredible and kids have really loved the changes to the program this year. We divide the kids into age-based groups and run rotations so their time with us is full of enrichment and fun. With us, they play games in the gym, visit the library, and do an art or science project all in one day at the ASP.

**Basketball:** Our 2024 Pendleton Youth Basketball, PYB, season is in full swing with practices running Mondays-Thursdays. We have 19 teams of players ages eight to twelve who will have games beginning in January. Additionally, after adamant requests from the community, we have also introduced a Lil' Bucks Basketball program this year! Spots for kindergarten, first, and second grade players were sold out within days of opening registration. In total, our Parks and Rec Basketball programs are serving 272 Pendleton youth.

**Events:** One of our core responsibilities as the Parks and Recreation department of Pendleton is to provide opportunities for families to spend worthwhile time with one another. We do this through a variety of events throughout the year. Our annual Daddy Daughter Dance is a rite of passage for our community, and the 2024 date is set for February 10th. This year, the 700 attendees can expect to see all of their favorites: our awesome DJ, the beautiful photo set provided by our talented photographer, and of course, the chocolate fountains!

Following the 2024 kickoff of Daddy Daughter Dance, we are also in the process of planning our Mother Daughter event, revamping our Mother Son event, getting our holiday events on the calendar, and even brainstorming new ideas! Be on the lookout for a Father Son activity, as well as an event for the whole family to get dressed up and dance, and more.

At Pendleton Parks and Recreation, we are always working to increase and improve the opportunities for the families in our community. We encourage you to be a part of the Parks and Rec this year through participating in programs, attending events, or even picking up a volunteering shift at our next activity!





#### Arts study shows \$14.7 million economic impact

#### Local report part of a nationwide study

Pendleton's Arts and Culture industry generated \$14.7 million in economic activity in 2022, according to the results of a new study. Arts & Economic Prosperity 6 (AEP6) is an economic and social impact study of the nonprofit arts and culture industry. Building on its 30-year legacy as the largest and most inclusive study of its kind, AEP6 uses a rigorous methodology to document the economic and social contributions of the nation's nonprofit arts and culture industry.

The Impact Study is led by Americans for the Arts, an Arts support organization in Washington, D.C. Groups across the country conduct the study at the community level, and there were 22 Oregon communities that participated this year, including Pendleton.

"The AEP6 results demonstrate how Pendleton art and cultural activities have a positive economic impact in our town," local coordinator Stephanie Huffman said. "The arts are a vital part of a healthy economy. Our results show overwhelming appreciation for local arts and cultural events."

Plans to bring the AEP study to Pendleton started in early 2021. The Pendleton Development Commission served as community partner, but the program struggled to make headway in the coronavirus pandemic and with coordinator turnover. Charles Denight, PDC associate director, said the survey took off when the deadline was extended until June 23, 2023, and the City of Pendleton hired Huffman to coordinate the project.

"In only a couple of months, Stephanie managed to complete hundreds of surveys, reaching a total of 613," Denight said. "Although we didn't make our goal of 800, I considered this to be an extraordinary accomplishment on her part."

As part of the study, Huffman surveyed people who attended arts and culture events as well as speaking with local non-profit culture organizations about their finances and spending in the community.

Overall, the study showed the nonprofit arts and culture industry in Pendleton generated \$14.7 million in economic activity during 2022—\$7.7 million in spending by arts and culture organizations and an additional \$7.0 million in event-related expenditures by their audiences. That economic activity supported 161 jobs, provided \$5.9 million in personal income to residents, and generated \$1.9 million in tax revenue to local, state, and federal governments.

Huffman said the results capture part of the Pendleton experience.

"The data analysis shows how money is spent not only on arts and cultural events but on many related expenses in Pend-

leton. When people attend a local event, they not only spend money on said event but on related activities, such as child care, food and drinks, and transportation," she said. "That money is circulated in our com-

munity. Additionally, these events provide a large number of jobs for our residents."

Additional highlights from the Pendleton AEP6 study include:

- In the City of Pendleton, nonprofit arts and culture organizations spent an estimated \$\$7.7 million which supported 79 jobs and generated \$893,001 in local, state, and federal government revenue.
- Event attendees spend an average of \$33.50 per person per event, beyond the cost of admission.
- 17.1% of attendees are nonlocal visitors who traveled from outside Umatilla County; they spend an average of \$87.26.
- 70.6% of nonlocal attendees reported that the primary purpose of their visit was specifically to attend the performance, event, exhibit, venue, or facility where they were surveyed.
- 92.3% of arts and culture attendees agree that the activity or venue where they were surveyed "is inspiring a sense of pride in this neighborhood or community."



# SCHOLARSHIP POLICY 2023-2024

Possible financial assistance levels: 20%, 40%, 60%, 80% based on need.

Please allow for up to 5 business days for processing and notification to awarding families.

Recreation Program Scholarship application process is separate from Aquatics scholarships. Participants can use the granted scholarship for **one** childcare based program (After School Program or Summer Adventure Camp) and **one** additional program per quarter\*.

All Recreation Program scholarship applications must be submitted in person to the Recreation Center at 510 SW Dorion Ave. in Pendleton.

Scholarships are granted for the fiscal year and will expire on the final day of June each year. Families can reapply in July.

All paperwork required for application must be present at time of submission.

- Wood that has been coated, painted, or pressure treated, which can damage your fireplace
- Plywood, particle board, or any wood with glue on or in it, like wooden pallets
- Rotted, diseased, or moldy wood, which can make those toxins airborne


