

FREQUENTLY ASK QUESTIONS

In an effort to better communicate with citizens we asked staff to provide answers to some of the more frequently asked questions. Below you will find a few of the most frequent questions, followed by answers given by the departments which hear them the most often.

WHAT IS BACKFLOW?

Backflow is the unwanted flow of non-potable substances back into the plumbing system and/or our public water system (i.e., drinking water). This backflow can occur when there's a sudden difference in water pressure between the two systems during waterline breaks, repairs, or a water supply shut off. Backflow preventers are mechanical devices designed to prevent backflow through these cross connections. However, for backflow preventers to protect as designed, they must meet stringent installation requirements and be inspected every year to ensure they're working properly and preventing contamination from entering the drinking water.

State of Oregon Requires Annual Backflow Inspection

In our complex water system, everything is connected. The City of Pendleton Cross-Connection and Prevention Program is required by the State of Oregon, Oregon Health Authority- Drinking Water Program under Oregon Administrative Rules (OAR) 333-061-0070. Regulations are designed to keep pollutants and contaminants from entering your clean drinking water system. For example, if you have irrigation, fire sprinkler or other water using systems, you may need to have the connection between your systems and the City's checked every year. It is important to ensure your backflow assembly valves are working properly to prevent pollutants and contaminants from entering the drinking water system. The City is committed to providing our customers clean, safe, drinking water.

Everything is Connected and Need Protection

If you receive a reminder letter that it's time for your annual Backflow Prevention Inspection, this information will tell you what it is and why it's important that you stay current on this inspection. Our clean drinking water depends on it.

Backflow Inspection Report Submittal Requirements

As of April 1st, 2021, all back flow inspection reports must be submitted electronically using a new online portal powered by TegrisFire.

WHY IS THE FRONT FENCE LIMITED TO 3-1/2 FEET?

The Unified Development Code, Ordinance 3845 states "Fences may be placed in the front or side yard abutting a street, provided such fence does not exceed three and one-half (3.5') feet in height." Typically, low front yard fences give a more neighborly feeling rather than an industrial, or high security type feeling, as with tall walls and fences. Just imagine what a neighborhood street would look like if every home had a 6' high fence, either solid or chain line, running along the frontage just behind the sidewalk. This street would feel and look like an industrial area.

Secondly, emergency services and delivery folks desire the ability to see the front of a home, and/or at least the front door. Package delivery drivers generally will not enter through a gated yard that they cannot see to the front door. This is for a few reasons, such as to make sure there are no dogs or other possible dangers or conflicts, as well as just knowing where the front door would be. It would be very frustrating for a delivery person to enter through a gate, only to find that there is no door on that side of the building, and there is a large growling dog behind it. Emergency services agree, if there is a problem at the home, they would like to see where the front door is so they know where to respond. They can



see that there are no dangers between the street and the door, such as dogs, or possibly intruders, children, construction equipment, or other issues.

Lastly, emergency services would like the front of a home visible from the street for just for overall patrol and safety. A 3-1/2' fence height provides a physical barrier, keeping people form loitering on private property, yet it can be seen over to the home. Yet it is low enough that it could be traversed by an emergency responder if needed. There would be much quicker responses to an emergency if the front of the home is visible from the street. Then pass-buyers can see if the house is on fire, or if there appears to be some other concerning appearance, such as smoke coming out of it, water pouring out of it, or a distraught person standing in the front door pleading for help. If the front of the home is not visible from the street, these situations may not become apparent to neighbors, people passing by, or emergency responders.

WHY DOES THE CITY OF PENDLETON ALLOW PANHANDLING?



Prior to 10/02/18, Ordinance 3409, the Noncriminal Offenses Ordinance, contained a provision which fell within the scope of being an "anti-panhandling" ordinance.

The Oregon branch of the ACLU contacted a number of Oregon local governments, including Pendleton, with concerns about their antipanhandling ordinances and requested that we immediately repeal our ordinance, which was styled as "Begging." The ACLU bases its request on a 2015 US Supreme Court case, *Reed v. Gilbert*, which finds "antipanhandling" to be unconstitutional in that it violates the First Amendment Right to free speech. In summary, it finds anti-panhandling ordinances amount to government regulation of speech. This line of law has been followed throughout the country.

In as much as prior to 2018 Pendleton had not enforced our anti-panhandling provision in decades, there was little need to risk having to face a constitutional challenge which would appear to have merit.

DOG LICENSE INFORMATION



A dog license is required for all dogs over the age of six months, living within the city limits of Pendleton unless specifically exempt. It is the duty of each owner or keeper of a dog to obtain a license (s) for their dog(s). The initial licensing of a dog must be accomplished within fourteen days of the date of acquiring a dog by a City resident or moving a dog into the City. The Licenses must be renewed annually on or before the first day of each year.

To get a city dog license, your dog must be currently inoculated with a rabies vaccination. The vaccination needs to be updated every one or

three years, depending on the type of vaccination given. A dog license may be purchased for up to three years through the year the rabies vaccination expires. Keeping your animals current on their vaccinations prevents the contraction and the spread of various diseases.

Exemptions from dog licenses:

- Dogs owned by dealers, breeders or exhibitors which are kept in kennels exclusively for sale or exhibition.
- Guide dogs when owned and kept as an aid to a blind person.
- Any dog under the supervision of its owner of manager which is actively engaged in the herding or control of livestock is exempt while engaged in such activity.
- Dogs less than six (6) months old.

An application for a dog license may be obtained at Pendleton City Hall or by downloading the <u>dog license application</u>. An application needs to be filled out for each dog being licensed.

Dog License applications can be completed and paid for online by visiting our <u>payment website</u>. Proof of rabies vaccinations must be emailed to <u>laura.gauthier@ci.pendleton.or.us</u>.

ARE YOU DOGS ALLOWED IN PARKS?

Dogs are allowed in all City parks, but pet owners must follow City Ordinance 2645, Sec. C. Dogs, which outlines the responsibility of pet owners to keep theirs dogs on a leash and in control at all time and to pick up dog waste.

Ordinance 2645, Sec. C. Dogs: No person shall permit any dog to run at large within any public park and all dogs shall be kept in control on leash at all times. Owners of dogs or other animals shall remove their animal's waste when it is deposited within any park or on any public walking surface.

AIRPORT TERMINAL REMODEL



Funded through a federal CARES Act grant earmarked for airports, the Terminal Renovation Project will update or replace aging equipment, including windows and the HVAC, electrical and plumbing systems. The project also includes renovating bathrooms and the restaurant kitchen as well as cosmetic improvements, such as paint, finishing and flooring

The entire project is expected to last about eight months.

During terminal construction, in-terminal access to Elvis' Bar and Grill will be closed, but the front entrance will remain open, and the restaurant will continue to operate. In coordination with Elvis' Bar and Grill, the time frame for the kitchen and bathroom renovation project has been identified as mid-September to mid-December. The timeline allows Elvis' Bar and Grill to remain open through the 2022 Pendleton Round-Up and then shut down for renovations.

WHY IT IS NEEDED

The Pendleton airport dates back to World War II, and the existing terminal building is more than 70 years old. The Renovation project makes the terminal more safe, more energy-efficient, and more comfortable for passengers

SW TUTUILLA ROAD SEWER LINE PROJECT



This project installs a 12" sanitary sewer main approximately 273 feet in length under Tutuilla Creek to Tutuilla Road and approximately 1,096 feet of 8" sanitary sewer pipe in Tutuilla Road up to SW Runnion Avenue. The project also includes:

- Connecting into an existing manhole by coring the existing manhole at Station 0+00 that presently has a 12" sanitary sewer line running through it adjacent to Tutuilla Creek
- Constructing a new 12", 3034 PVC pipe through a new manhole
- Installation of an outside drop manhole and two separate 8" lines are to be installed, one to the east right-of-way line or Tutuilla Road at approximately 12 feet deep, and one continuing south on Tutuilla Road at a depth between 6 and 7 feet deep
- Two 8" lines and one 6" line will be stubbed out to the east right-of-way of Tutuilla Road for future extension
- Three 4" service laterals will be stubbed out to adjacent parcels lying on the west side of Tutuilla Road Replacement of some curb, gutter, and sidewalk/driveway approaches as needed to install new service laterals and stub -outs for future extension

WHY IT IS NEEDED

This project extends wastewater service into property slated for future development.




