### IT HAS BEEN A GREAT RIDE

Wow, it is hard to believe 36-years in Pendleton has flown by quickly. It has been a pleasure to serve the Pendleton community and Eastern Oregon in several roles over the years.

I moved to Pendleton in April 1988, after graduating from Oregon State University with a degree in Civil Engineering, Water Resources Option. My first Pendleton employment chapter is written around working for the State of Oregon Drinking Water Program for six years. I personally had the chance to travel and "pass" the water of communities throughout 12 counties of Eastern Oregon. I also received my Civil and Environmental professional engineering license during this chapter, making me either an environmentally civil or civilly environmental engineer – maybe a little of both.

After six great years of experience, I joined the City of Pendleton as its first Regulatory Specialist. In this employment chapter, I oversaw the City's water system sampling and the drafting and adoption of numerous Oregon Occupational Safety & Health Administration related City policies. Unfortunately, this chapter did not include much work in the way of engineering, making it the shortest of my chapters. I was pulled away to a new employment chapter when the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation (CTUIR) solicited for newly created Public Works Director position. I was pleasantly surprised to be offered the position, and it turned out to be a fantastic chapter for my career growth. I managed the water and sewer system upgrades and expansion for the CTUIR community and the backbone infrastructure expansion for Wildhorse Resort. During this chapter, I also worked on the CTUIR and City joint water supply project considerations and a final report. It was on the basis of this work, the City made an offer to have me come back and lead the effort and work on the Water Filtration Plant and Aquifer Storage & Recovery Program. In hindsight, I had the most fun and growth with this chapter. As this chapter came to a close in June 2003, I was offered to assume the City's Public Works Director position.

This last chapter serving the Pendleton community has been extremely fulfilling for the last 21-plus years. I have enjoyed working with great staff over the years and leading legacy projects that will continue to benefit the overall community for a long time to come. In recognition of my service to the community, I was blessed by my peers in public works to receive the 2016 Top Ten Public Works Leader of the Year award, which serves as the highlight of my working professional career. As I ride off into the sunset and close this chapter of my story, I look forward to tracking the continued progress of the CTUIR and Pendleton communities' development in retirement.

Then there is my personal chapter(s) intertwined with my employment chapters. In 1991, I met my better half when she came to the United States on an around-the-world trip, having just graduated from University of Western Australia. As part of her trip, she served six months as a volunteer research assistant at the




Please know from the bottom of my heart, we have been blessed by this community and your support – so "thank you" to all of you – you will be remembered.

### Jeff Brown named Pendleton Public Works Director

Brown will replace Bob Patterson after retirement

Jeff Brown has been named the new Public Works Director for the City of Pendleton. He will take over the leadership position on July 1.

Currently the Public Works Assistant Director, Brown first came to the City of Pendleton on Jan. 4, 1993, as a utility worker. He worked his way up the ranks and served as Public Works Superintendent in 2003, a position he held until last year when he became the Assistant Director for Public Works.

"Jeff has spent his whole career here with the City of Pendleton, and he has proven himself to be a go-to person," City Manager Robb Corbett said. "During his time with the City, he has proven his love and dedication for this town, and I cannot picture a better person for this role."

Born and raised in Pendleton, Brown said he works in Public Works because there is a new challenge every day. Brown takes over as the Public Works Director on July 1, filling the role left by outgoing director Bob Patterson.

### **Goat Watch 2024**

Since 2012, the City has contracted to bring in prescriptive livestock – in this case, goats – to cut down unwanted vegetation on city-owned properties that are difficult to maintain. Prescriptive grazing helps to reduce fuel loads and open up views of the Umatilla River. Grazing also provides better ability to inspect the levee, storm water outfalls and overall conditions of storm drainage.

The City of Pendleton is currently running our regular "Goat Watch" posts on social media. Watch Facebook for our Goat Watch graphic to know when and where the goats are each week during grazing season.

If you do go out to view the goats in other areas, please remember to view the animals from afar and without trespassing. ### McKennon McDonald is mayor elect

In the May election, Pendleton voters selected McKennon McDonald as Pendleton's next mayor. Below is a portion of the OPB article, "Mayoral candidates meet and miss milestones in Umatilla County" written by Antonio Sierra.

A former elementary school teacher, McDonald remembered the conversations she would have with students walking by the wall of mayors in city hall.

"We talk about what's missing there and the representation piece, and it's always something that, interestingly enough, the kids haven't really pointed out on their own," she said. "But it's something that has always been a big point of me to say, 'You do have female elected officials representing you on the council."

Even with that in mind, McDonald said she decided early in her campaign that her gender would not be the center of her pitch to voters.

Born and raised in Pendleton, McDonald got involved in local politics soon after receiving a bachelor's degree from the University of Portland. At 23, she beat a former city councilor to win a seat on the city council. Four years into her tenure, McDonald was named council president.

When Mayor John Turner announced his retirement last year, McDonald entered the race with the intent of continuing the efforts Turner helped shepherd over the past eight years, a list that includes housing, sustainable infrastructure and economic development.

Obtaining a promotion to mayor means McDonald will actually give up some of her power. Pendleton has a weak mayor system, meaning the mayor doesn't have any day-to-day responsibilities or a regular vote on the city council.

McDonald said she was motivated to run for mayor because she will have the ability to shape debate during city council meetings and represent Pendleton during state-level discussions...

... McDonald understands the context of her milestone in a town known for its cowboy heritage. She serves on a council with gender parity and as mayor, she'll also serve as an ex-officio member of the Pendleton Round-Up Board of Directors. A woman now serves as president of the rodeo board, which didn't elect its first female member until 2010, its 100th year.

McDonald said she chose to name her campaign "McKennon for Mayor" as both a way to stress her approachability and as a departure from her old professional title.

"I spent most of my career being Mrs. McDonald," she said, referring to her life in education. "And this was the opportunity where I just wanted to be McKennon."

### Pendleton awarded \$2.5 million grant for Fire Station 2

Business Oregon has awarded Pendleton Fire & Ambulance a grant for just under \$2.5 million for seismic rehabilitation of Fire State 2. Opened in 1972, Fire Station 2 is staffed with firefighter paramedics 24/7 and serves the south side of the fire and ambulance districts. It is the oldest fire station used by Pendleton Fire & Ambulance.

Business Oregon manages the state's Seismic Rehabilitation Grant Program, which is designed to prepare and strengthen public services buildings



against earthquakes. Through the Seismic Rehabilitation Grant Program, Business Oregon awarded close to \$90 million to support seismic safety for emergency services buildings and schools across Oregon. The competitive grant program received more than 100 applications requesting almost \$240 million in funding this year.

Fire Chief Anthony Pierotti said the grant will remodel Fire Station 2 to meet earthquake preparedness requirements, but, if possible, he would like to use the renovation as an opportunity to bring the 52-year-old station up to other standards

"Station 2 has been on our radar. It is old, and it doesn't really support the personnel that we have," Pierotti said. "The whole grant revolves around rehabbing that building to come up to seismic standards, but, within that construction, we hope to be able to make some modernizations and improvements."

For example, Fire Station 2 uses an open dorm concept common in the 1970s, which no longer meets the needs of the co-ed department staff. Pierotti said he hopes to improve the dorm and restroom facilities to meet current needs. The rehabilitation will also help Pendleton Fire & Ambulance get ahead of upcoming OSHA restrictions involving exhaust and living spaces before those go into effect.

### Tree Commission—1 opening

The Tree Commission is charged with advising the City Council with regard to all tree matters in parks, along streets and in public areas.

### The Transportation Committee—2 openings

The Transportation Committee provides direction on transportation programs, including senior/disabled taxi tickets, general public taxi tickets, senior meal site transportation, a daily van service serving the general public, parks and recreation summer inter-park rides, and an aquatic center summer transport.

### SEASONAL LABORER
