Pendleton Development Commission Budget Committee,

As this budget overview was written Oregon was in the midst of an economic disaster historic to our state, our nation and our town. Uncertainty as to the future was as frightening as the terrible pandemic that led to the economic downtown. We were reminded that we're all in this together and that together we will work our way forward.

Partnerships--team efforts, typified the progress of Pendleton Urban Renewal in this past year.

Working with the Pendleton Downtown Association, the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce and the City's own Economic Development Department, Pendleton Urban Renewal was able to fund and distribute emergency grants to our suffering small businesses within the urban renewal district. These businesses, many of them begun with urban renewal support, were given a lifeline. Now we fervently work for their return, eventually stronger than ever.

But there were many partnerships during the year.

Pendleton Urban Renewal partnered with the Pendleton Public Works Department to reconstruct a major street, with the promise of more to come. The City of Pendleton has spared no effort over the past several years to find a solution to street repair funding and Urban Renewal is filling part of that need.

In downtown Pendleton Urban Renewal partnered with a local developer to complete over 18 apartments with an additional five to 16 underway. More are scheduled to begin in 2021 and 2022. These apartment projects not only provide badly needed affordable housing. They also lead to the restoration of historic treasures in Pendleton's downtown and to increased revenue to the City and to partner taxing districts in the county.

Several of our fraternal organizations have been forced to vacate their historic lodges in downtown Pendleton over the past decade and more. This past year brought a new developer back to his hometown to begin the restoration of the former Elks Club, with support from Urban Renewal. His long-term goal is a dynamic gathering place for all sorts of public events.

Partnering with longtime historic and cultural fixture the Pendleton Underground Tours, Urban Renewal provided financial assistance in two important grants, one for the upgrade of historic shop windows on SW Emigrant Ave. While historic designs were maintained, new energy-efficiency now provides comfort to both visitors and staff. The other grant underwrote the renovation of an apartment upstairs. Now there's an added comfortable location for visitors and entertainers to spend a night in downtown Pendleton.

Round-Up, Pendleton's most famous historic and sports event, was a partner with Urban Renewal in the construction of its new headquarters and retail venue. The new structure picks up elements of the design of the nearby historic Round-Up Arena while it provides a state-of-the-art home for staff, rodeo fans shoppers, just in time for the opening of Round-Up's 110th annual performance.

Joe's Fiesta, a popular downtown Mexican restaurant, has a classic new look outside and a new interior remodel aimed at expanding this popular Main Street attraction, thanks to a partnership with Urban Renewal.

Sisters Café, Joe's neighbor on Main Street, completed a dramatic re-do of its previously remuddled historic façade, bringing it back to the classic design that would have been familiar to early 20th century Pendleton shoppers. Then, with additional Urban Renewal support, the owner moved upstairs, beginning a second story restoration that will wrap up some time in the next two years.

Hines Meat Company is entering the Pendleton market from its starting base in La Grande. This introduction was smoothed by assistance from Pendleton Urban Renewal that began when a team of city staffers in a planning retreat decided that a local meat processing and retail outlet was just what Pendleton needed.

An introduction to Urban Renewal's many partnerships and team efforts wouldn't be complete without pointing to the several committees that assist the Pendleton Development Commission in developing policies and reviewing applications for financial assistance from businesses and building owners.

The PDC Advisory Committee is a key stop for many policy issues. As its name implies the Committee discusses then recommends policy and process steps that the PDC can then review before deciding how it wants to proceed.

The Jump Start Committee reviews loan applications from businesses seeking a hand in getting started or expanding. The Committee also oversees fresh new approaches to marketing Pendleton to businesses and encouraging stronger local entrepreneurs.


The Façade/Second Story Committee reviews grant applications, then forwards its recommendations to the PDC for final approval. Like the Jump Start committee this committee is made up of volunteer citizens who willingly give up hours each month to assist in furthering economic development in their town.

Partnerships and team efforts are all part of the economic progress we've seen in downtown Pendleton thanks to our 17-year-old urban renewal program. Now, in a time of uncertainty, it is playing a key role in helping businesses and building owners through a tough time, knowing that it will reach a point where it can return to boosting our businesses and restoring the many historic buildings that provide Pendleton's cultural and historic heart.

Description of Revenue Sources

The Pendleton Development Commission oversees the Pendleton Urban Renewal Program, which provides funding within the Pendleton Downtown/Riverfront Urban Renewal District. The PDC is a separate legal entity from the City of Pendleton. Property taxes within the District are frozen at the level for the 2003-2004 tax year for 20 years. Any increase in taxes on properties over the frozen level within the District goes to the Urban Renewal Program.

FY21 Projections of Revenues

The beginning fund balance consists of reserves from the current fiscal year. Taxes are based on FY19-20 current tax receipts estimation with a 3% increase from estimated receipts in FY20. Taxes are expected to be less than budgeted for FY20.

Description of Current Services

The Urban Renewal Program is a separate district from the City of Pendleton. The Pendleton City Council also serves as the board members of the Pendleton Development Commission with advice from a separate advisory committee. The Debt Service receives tax dollars and uses the tax dollars to pay the Urban Renewal Agency's debt.

FY21 Proposed Budget

Reimbursement to the City includes \$63,600 for the Associate Director's salary and direct supplies and the balance is for City reimbursement for personnel, materials, audit, bookkeeping, payroll and other services provided to support the Urban Renewal Agency. Debt payments are for a credit line loan with a local institution.





The PDC has one credit line for up to \$2 million for the remaining years of the PDC authorized. Those funds will help finance second story development, demolition grants, jump start loans to downtown owners, facade restoration and possible development of a festival area. The PDC contracts for a Associate Director's position with the City of Pendleton. The concept of an urban renewal district is based on borrowing dollars now to invest in the development of the district and those investment dollars will bring a increased tax return on the dollar in future years.
