



When selecting plant materials, consider using USDA PLANT HARDINESS ZONE 4-6 (minimum average temps: -20 to 0 °F). Pendleton is USDA Plant Hardiness Zone 7a, but for especially frosty sites, it is recommended to go no higher than Zone 5!

Mature Height color codes:

Max 25': Under power lines. Planting space: minimum of 4 ft<sup>2</sup> (see downtown trees at end).

Max 50: Give them plenty of room. Planting space: minimum of 36 ft<sup>2</sup>.

Over 50: Parks and wide-open spaces. At least 35' from house or structure.

Growth Rate (GR): F=fast, M=medium, S=slow

Narrow Crown: Mature width is less than 20', making it ideal for downtown area or near structures.
